


Although the borrowed gowns have been returned to their owners, a display of gowns found here at the Village is still in the Institute until the end of July to allow those who missed out on

It has been well-received by visitors and stands proudly in the Stables on display.


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COMPLETION OF THE STORAGE SHED

As mentioned in our last Newsletter, the **History Trust** of South Australia through a 'MaC SmartyGrants' had presented the Historical Village with a grant of \$20,000 towards building a new Storage Unit in a section of the Men's Shed.

This unit has been finally completed and the work of storing goods will begin shortly. The first exercise will be to build shelving for storage purposes, then to transfer stores to the new area. We would like to acknowledge the wonderful help and support that the **History Trust of South Australia** has given the LHV with this huge grant and we look forward to putting the storage unit to good use.

The unit will be air conditioned with a controlled atmosphere to make sure that all items of value will be kept in good condition.

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AND COMPLETION OF THE RAILWAY LINE

After a lot of work, the railway line replacement of the sleepers has been finalized including the cross over giving access to the fruit packing area, etc. The volunteers have worked hard to replace old wooden sleepers (that had rotted and worn away) with steel sleepers from the original Yinkanie line. They have managed to have the line repaired in readiness for the centenary celebrations of when it was first laid between Yinkanie and Wanbi line opened on 4th September 1925 and closed May 1st 1971.



NEW THATCHING IS ON ITS WAY

We are so grateful to a Friend of the Village who does not live locally but is very passionate to assist.

Ian Wedding has supplied the Village with bales of new hay, plus helped to re-thatch the roofs of the Barn and the Mallee Root Shed and after completing his farm duties, will be back to complete the large thatched roof in the Agriculture area as well as the small garden gazebo situated behind the entrance area.
